Will be a 0.45-mill renewal with a 0.18-mill increase to fund the operation of a 9-1-1 system

FACTS

The current 9-1-1 levy is due to expire at the end of this year. The levy will fund:

- 9-1-1 emergency dispatching covering the fastest-growing county in Ohio with a current population of 198,000 and a service area of 459 square miles
- Upgrade of 9-1-1 system to allow for "text 9-1-1" service
- Maintenance of countywide radio system for emergency responders
- Ongoing 9-1-1 dispatcher training for police, fire and medical emergency responses
- 29 full-time and 3 part-time budgeted positions

Call Statistics:

- In 2015, 41,491 emergency 9-1-1 calls and 71,629 non-emergency calls were answered; that's an average of 113 emergency and 196 non-emergency calls per day
- Quick response to callers, as our average answer time is less than 10 seconds

PROPOSED LEVY:

The proposed five-year levy is a renewal of the existing 0.45-mill levy with a 0.18-mill increase for a total millage of 0.63 mill.
