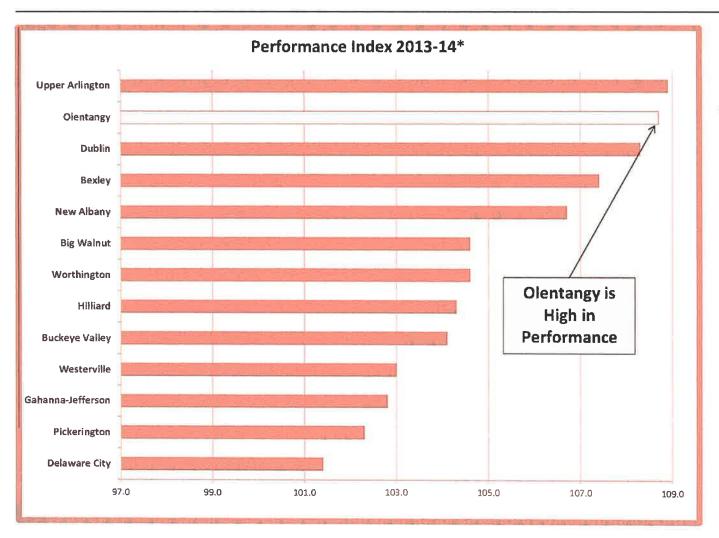

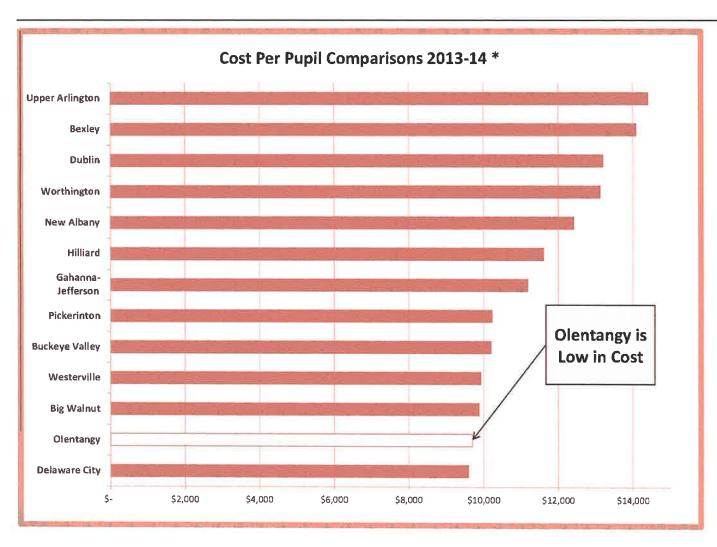

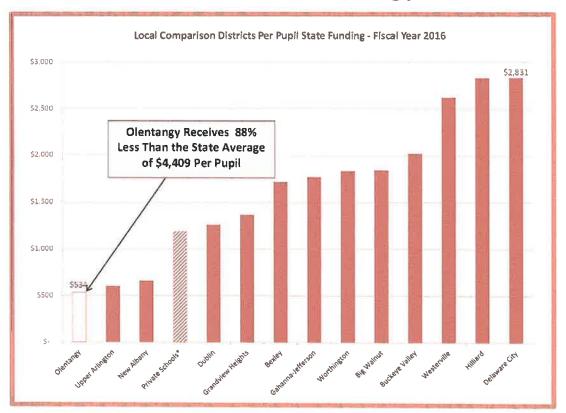

School Funding Defies Logic

As new students come in to Olentangy, the district does not receive anywhere close to the additional revenue it takes to educate them. The district tries to stretch dollars as far as it can, but there comes a point when additional revenue is needed.

- With minor exceptions, property taxes do not increase when home values increase – only through a vote of the people.
- The state has capped Olentangy's funding as a wealthy district.
- Olentangy receives less from the State than even private schools receive on a per pupil basis.

 - District spends ~\$9,700 annually per student
 - Assuming an averaged priced home with 2 students, the homeowner.pays~\$4,300 in annual school taxes for operating expenses (\$5,200 including taxes paid for bonds) but receives an education worth~\$19,400
