Six-Car Accident | A car cut across two lanes of travel and braked quickly which caused five other vehicles to brake and strike one another. The first car is unknown and left the scene.


Solicitors | Two individuals were observed soliciting without permits in Powell. One provided false identification. A supervisor became argumentative. They were warned for soliciting without a permit.





13-MONTH PATTERN OF CRASHES




MAP OF TRAFFIC CRASHES
