

PROMOTION



Sgt. **Ron Sallows** was recently promoted to serve as the Powell Police Department's new Deputy Chief of Police.

He was sworn in to his new position on Thursday, Jan. 9 in the Municipal Building Council Chambers.

Sallows has been a member of the Powell Police Department since 1999. He started his career in law enforcement as a police officer at the Medical College of Ohio Police Department in Toledo. In 1999, the Powell Police Department hired Sallows as a patrol officer. He was promoted to sergeant in 2005.

"Ron has served in our Police Department for nearly 21 years," said Chief Stephen Hrytzik. "We look forward to having Ron serve in this role in our agency. He brings a wealth of knowledge and expertise in law enforcement and will continue to drive our community policing philosophy."

He has been chosen as the "Officer of the Year" three times and received a "Meritorious Service Award" for his assistance dealing with a human trafficking case in 2015. Additionally, he was recognized as the "Member of the Year" for the Ohio Chapter of the FBI National Academy Associates in 2018.

"As Deputy Chief, I will continue to serve the City as I have for the past 21 years and will focus on continuing to provide excellent service to the community by solving problems, networking with residents and businesses, keeping response times low, and encouraging the professional development of police department employees," said Deputy Chief Sallows.

K-9 ACTIVITY

K-9 Axel and his handler, **Officer Jason Latiolais** participated in one article search, two community engagements, and three narcotics sniffs in January. The sniffs resulted in one arrest. Axel and his handler trained 11 hours in January.

TRAINING



In January the department conducted 80 hours of training to include **Medical Preparedness and Response for Bombing Incidents.** The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) developed this intensive training for supervisors and investigators. •

TRAFFIC SURVEYS (STEALTH STAT)

The City of Powell Police Department uses this data to assign officers for selective enforcement efforts.

Average Speed: The average speed of all vehicles registered by the StealthStat device.

85th Percentile: 85 percent of all vehicles were at this speed or slower.

Ten-Mile Pace: The range of speeds in which the majority of vehicles were traveling.

Vehicles per Hour: On busy streets, the device cannot accurately count vehicles in the far lane.


