
merchandise from the vehicle. Officers also retrieved a stolen loaded firearm which had been thrown from the vehicle immediately before the stop. •



COVID-19

The Powell Police Department is taking many precautionary measures to keep our community and the agency safe. The department acted early to procure the necessary supplies for cleaning, disinfecting, and personal protective equipment (PPE). Employees and visitors take their temperature before entering the station. Schedules have been adjusted to minimize the risk of exposure. Most training and Community Engagement activities are canceled or postponed.

The police lobby remains open, but residents are encouraged to contact us by phone or email if possible. Fingerprinting services are suspended.

We are offering Well-Being House Checks to residents who are senior citizens, live alone, or have medical conditions preventing them from leaving home. ◆

TRAFFIC SURVEY (STEALTH STAT)

The City of Powell Police Department uses this data to assign officers for selective enforcement efforts.

Average Speed: The average speed of all vehicles registered by the StealthStat device. **85th Percentile:** 85 percent of all vehicles were at this speed or slower.

Ten-Mile Pace: The range of speeds in which the majority of vehicles were traveling. **Vehicles per Hour:** On busy streets, the device cannot accurately count vehicles in the far lane.



SERGEANT BORUCHOWITZ SWORN IN




Sgt. Ben Boruchowitz was sworn in as the City's new police sergeant on April 13, 2020. He was hired by the Powell Police Department as a patrol officer in May of 2004 and has spent the last 16 years in that role.

During his career as a patrol officer, Ben has taken on numerous leadership roles and assignments. He is a field-training officer and is actively involved with the training of new recruits and a member of the agency's accreditation team responsible for ensuring our policies are in compliance with the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement (CALEA) standards. Officer Boruchowitz was recognized for his efforts with the accreditation process in 2017 when he received the agency's Meritorious Service Award. Ben is fluent in Spanish and provides regular language assistance to both local and federal law enforcement partners.

Sergeant Boruchowitz is the agency's Intelligence Liaison Officer with the Department of Homeland Security. He has been an active member of the Ohio Crime Prevention Association and is certified as a Crime Prevention Officer. He is certified by the Ohio Peace Officer Training Academy as a Master Evidence Technician and Master Criminal Investigator. Ben received a Lifesaving Award in 2009 after performing CPR on an unresponsive resident prior to the arrival of medical personnel. In 2013, he was awarded the agency's Officer of the Year recognition as well.

As a Patrol Sergeant, Ben will continue to act as a leader within the police department. He looks forward to being a mentor to younger officers and working to continually find better ways to serve the residents of Powell through active community policing efforts.

NEW COMMUNITY ORIENTED POLICING OFFICER (C.O.P.)



The Powell Police Department created a Community Oriented Policing (C.O.P.) position to educate the public about the department, maintain or increase public confidence and trust in law enforcement, decrease fear of crime, listen to and address citizen concerns, and implement community programs together with community members to solve problems. Officer Audrey Wilt was selected to fill this new position.

Officer Audrey Wilt started her career in criminal justice as a 911 Operator and Dispatcher in 2005 with the Mansfield Police Department. While working as a dispatcher she earned a Bachelor of Science Degree from the University of Cincinnati in Addictions Studies. Audrey then completed the Ohio State Highway Patrol Basic Police Academy and began working as a patrol officer with the Mansfield Police Department in 2007.

In 2009 Audrey was hired by the Powell Police Department and has worked as a patrol officer with the department since. Audrey is an Evidence Technician, LEADS TAC, radKIDS Instructor, RAD

Women Instructor, Ohio Crime Prevention Specialist, and Child Passenger Safety Seat Technician. Audrey was awarded Officer of the Year in 2015. She joined the Delaware County Crisis Negotiator Team in 2019.

With a passion for community service and outreach, Audrey has organized and participated in many programs for the Powell Police Department during her career. She coordinates the Citizens Police Academy Class and is the liaison to the Citizens Police Academy Alumni Association. She also plans Mystery Night Out and Coffee with a Cop. She teaches child and women's self-defense programs. She has helped bring newer programs such as Late Skate and Helpers and Heroes to Powell, as well as participating in community favorite programs like Safety Camp and Touch-A-Truck. Audrey is very excited to continue to grow the Powell Police Department's Community Outreach in her new position.
