NOTABLE CASE







DRONE PROGRAM

The drone program recorded 11 flights in October, including video of the site of the fatal traffic crash on Sawmill Parkway at Woodcutter Drive. This proved valuable for the accident reconstruction process. Officer Jared Wilt was the pilot for that flight, and he used the Mavic Enterprise drone.

TRAINING

In October the department conducted 297 hours of training to include **Verbal De- Escalation**, **Use of Force**, **Defensive Tactics**, **Firearms**, **Simunitions**, **Child Safety Seats**, **Bias Policing**, **Pursuit**, **Victim's Rights**, **Managing the Discipline Process** and **Legal Considerations for Internal Investigations**. •

USE OF FORCE

The Powell Police Department carefully tracks all uses of force by the agency. In the interest of transparency, we will report these incidents monthly. There was one use of force in October.

Display of Weapons. On October 3, officers initiated a traffic stop on a vehicle fitting the description of one involved in a shooting in Dublin. Dublin officers interviewed the driver and passenger on scene and determined they were not the wanted suspects, so they were promptly released. The actual suspects turned themselves in later that night. •

CALEA ACCREDITATION

The agency participated in a virtual On-Site Assessment October 12-14, 2020. Areas of focus were Patrol (especially the drone program), Investigations, All Hazards, and Records (especially body-camera video). Officer Scott Sanford, Acceditation Manager, expects the final report in a few months, and re-accreditation is expected in March.

STAFF MEETING

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2019 annual staff meeting was not held until October this year. After the Pledge of Allegiance and the Law Enforcement Code of Ethics, Chief and Deputy Chief shared departmental news. Guests included City Manager Andy White, Municipal Prosecutor Natalia Harris, and Coroner's Investigator Charlie Carson.

Sergeant Andy Lucas presented the awards for 2019.

- The Lifesaving awards for Officers Josh Waymire and Ken Hiltz will be presented during a City Council meeting in November.
- Detective Darren Smith was awarded Officer of the Year for his willingness to help throughout the department, the Light Ohio Blue project, representing the agency at funerals, and his work following through with the Brandon Ivy murder case.



- Officer Ken Hiltz was recognized for 25 years of service.
- Officers Jason Latiolais, Ryan Pentz and Fred Hart were recognized for 20 years of service.
- Sergeant Scott Roach and Clerk Patti Mills were recognized for 15 years of service.
- Officer Audrey Will received a Letter of Recognition for skillfully de-escalating a traffic stop with an intoxicated individual.
- Clerk Rebecca Wenden received a Letter of Recognition for rebranding the agency's paperwork.
- Officer Audrey Wilt was recognized for 10 years of safe driving.

TRAFFIC SURVEY (STEALTH STAT)

The Police Department uses this data to assign officers for selective enforcement efforts.

Average Speed: The average speed of all vehicles registered by the StealthStat device.

85th Percentile: 85 percent of all vehicles were at this speed or slower.

Ten-Mile Pace: The range of speeds in which the majority of vehicles were traveling. **Vehicles per Hour:** On busy streets, the device cannot accurately count vehicles in the far lane.



MAP OF TRAFFIC CRASHES




October 2020 Crash Type

Mr. Fauris,

Thank you for reaching out to me regarding your speed concern for Liberty Street. Most of the west side or southbound lane of Liberty Street is within the City of Powell, and the right side or northbound lane lies within Liberty Twp. which is serviced by the Delaware County Sheriffs' Office. I will have our staff put up a stealth-stat speed measuring device in the area next week to determine vehicles' speeds by the time of day. After the speed analysis report comes back, I will share this information with the Delaware County Sheriff's Office and will assign officers from our department to work the area during times when speeding is an issue. Hopefully, between the two agencies, we will be able to address your concerns.

A formatted version of the Stealth Stat Speed Report will be made available on our City of Powell Website.
