NOTABLE CASES



USE OF FORCE

The Powell Police Department carefully tracks all uses of force by the agency. In the interest of transparency, we will report these incidents monthly. There were no uses of force in January. •

TRAFFIC SURVEY (STEALTH STAT)

The Police Department uses this data to assign officers for selective enforcement efforts.

Average Speed: The average speed of all vehicles registered by the StealthStat device. **85th Percentile:** 85 percent of all vehicles were at this speed or slower.

Ten-Mile Pace: The range of speeds in which the majority of vehicles were traveling. **Vehicles per Hour:** On busy streets, the device cannot accurately count vehicles in the far lane.



| CASE | DATE | CAUSE | NARRATIVE |

| 21-0004 | 1/2/21 | FAILURE TO YIELD | Unit 1 was sitting stationary, waiting to pull out of the parking lot at 240 North Liberty Street onto Grace Drive. Unit 1 was too far into the roadway, and Unit 2 struck the front of Unit 1 as it drove eastbound on Grace Drive. |
| 21-0017 | 1/15/21 | ACDA | Unit 2 was traveling eastbound on SR 750 when it was rear ended by Unit 1, as it was stopped in traffic at SR 750 and Sycamore Ridge Drive. CITED. |
| 21-0018 | 1/16/21 | BACKING | Unit 1 reported backing out of a driveway (westbound) at 28 Bartholomew Blvd. While backing, Unit 1 struck a street lamp across the street. CITED. |

| 21-0019 | 1/19/21 | FAILURE TO CONTROL | Unit 1 was northbound on Liberty Road. Unit 1 attempted to make a left hand turn westbound onto Seldom Seen Road and slid northwest into a crosswalk sign, then into steel cable connected to a utility pole. CITED. |
| 21-0021 | 1/19/21 | ACDA | Unit 2 was stopped at the intersection of Sawmill Parkway and North Hampton Drive, facing northbound. Unit 1 failed to stop and struck Unit 2 from behind. CITED. |
| 21-0024 | 1/19/21 | TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICE | Unit 1 was westbound, and Unit 2 was eastbound on SR 750 approaching the intersection of Grace Drive. Unit 2 stopped in the intersection, awaiting a break in traffic to make a left turn onto Grace Drive. The driver of Unit 2 stated the light turned red, and he proceeded to turn left. Unit 2 was struck by Unit 1 within the intersection. The driver of Unit 1 advised he proceeded through a yellow light and Unit 2 turned into him. |
| 21-0027 | 1/20/21 | ACDA | Unit 1 and Unit 2 were traveling eastbound on Seldom Seen Road from Sawmill Parkway. Unit 2 had stopped in traffic and was rear ended by Unit 1. CITED. |
| 21-0029 | 1/22/21 | FAILURE TO YIELD | Unit 2 was westbound on SR 750. Unit 1 exited the parking lot of 15 E Olentangy Street and struck Unit 2. CITED. |
| 21-0037 | 1/24/21 | FAILURE TO CONTROL | Unit 1 was stopped in the roadway of Sawmill Parkway near Dolman Drive facing westbound. Unit 2 was traveling southbound and struck Unit 1. Unit 2 then crossed the median into the northbound lanes of travel. |
| 21-0038 | 1/25/21 | FAILURE TO CONTROL | Unit 2 was parked in a parking space near 12 Village Pointe Drive, as Unit 1 attempted to turn into the parking lot. Unit 1 slid on ice and struck the driver's side rear corner of Unit 2 with the driver's side front of Unit 1. |
| 21-0039 | 1/25/21 | FAILURE TO CONTROL | Unit 1 was negotiating the turn in front of 4706 Village Club Drive when it slid on ice striking two trees and a mailbox with the passenger rear. |
