

CRISIS INTERVENTION TEAM



Police respond to many calls that are not criminal in nature. Using a CIT (Crisis Intervention Team) disposition notifies HelpLine of Delaware and Morrow Counties that there is a need for further assistance. HelpLine reviews the call information and assigns


follow up by agencies such as Maryhaven, SourcePoint, Syntero, or the Delaware County Board of Mental Health.

In April, there were seven calls with CIT dispositions.

USE OF FORCE

The Powell Police Department carefully tracks all uses of force by the agency.

TRAFFIC SURVEY (STEALTH STAT)

The Police Department uses this data to assign officers for selective enforcement efforts.

Average Speed: The average speed of all vehicles registered by the StealthStat device. **85th Percentile:** 85 percent of all vehicles were at this speed or slower.

Ten-Mile Pace: The range of speeds in which the majority of vehicles were traveling. **Vehicles per Hour:** On busy streets, the device cannot accurately count vehicles in the far lane.




TRAFFIC CRASHES

CASE	DATE	CAUSE	NARRATIVE
21-0281	4/3/2021	BACKING	Units 1 and 2 were both backing from parking spaces, located in the lot of 10688 Sawmill Pkwy. Both units started backing around the same time frame. Unit 2 came to a complete stop, after seeing Unit 1, as Unit 1 backed into Unit 2.
21-0287	4/6/2021	CONTROL	Unit 1 was towing a 50' utility pole on a trailer heading westbound on SR 750. Unit 1 was attempting to turn northbound on to N. Liberty St. from SR 750 when the trailer struck the base of the traffic signal post.
21-0300	4/12/2021	HIT-SKIP	Unit 1 was northbound on N. Liberty St. approaching Grace Dr. Unit 1 turned right onto Grace Dr., went over the curb and struck a light pole. Unit 1 left the scene without reporting the crash.
21-0303	4/13/2021	YIELD	Unit 1 was pulling into the lot at 4000 West Powell. Unit 2 was attempting to cross traffic, south to north. Unit 1 struck Unit 2. The intersection is set up in a manner where Unit 2 had the right of way.

21-0308	4/14/2021	ACDA	Injury Units 1 and 2 were eastbound on Powell Road east of Murphy Parkway. Unit 2 stopped for traffic and was struck in the rear by Unit 1. CITED
21-0320	4/20/2021	HIT-SKIP	Unit 2 was parked on the east side of Bakircay Lane, in front of house number 8989 Bakircay Lane, facing the wrong direction. Unit 1 appears to have been traveling northbound and struck Unit 2 in the passenger side. Unit 1 did not stop and they did not report the crash.
21-0325	4/23/2021	CONTROL	Unit 1 was eastbound on Sanderling Ave. Unit 1 struck a mailbox with the passenger side mirror.
21-0327	4/23/2021	ACDA	Injury Units 1, 2, and 3 were eastbound on SR 750 just past Liberty St. Unit 3 stopped, trying to make a left-hand turn into a private drive. Unit 2 began slowing as to not strike Unit 3. Unit 1 struck Unit 2 from behind, pushing Unit 2 into Unit 3. CITED
21-0329	4/25/2021	BACKING	Unit 2 was parked and unoccupied in a handicap parking spot at 4000 W. Powell Rd. Unit 1 struck Unit 2 while attempting to park next to Unit 2. Both vehicles were facing northbound.
21-0336	4/28/2021	OVI	Injury Units 1 and 2 were southbound on Sawmill Rd. approaching Grandshire Dr. Unit 2 stopped to make a left hand turn to head east on Grandshire Drive and was struck by Unit 1 from behind. CITED
