NOTABLE CASES

Threats/Harassment | A resident exchanged nude photos with a subject on a dating app. The subject then demanded money and theatened to distribute the photos. The incident is under investigation.

Criminal Damaging | A side mirror was broken off a car parked at a business on Moreland Street. A suspect was identified on video and charged with the offense.

Theft | A purse was stolen from a car on Sawmill Parkway while the owner was pumping gas. Investigation revealed several similar crimes around central Ohio. In cooperation with Blendon Township, Columbus and Dublin police departments, a suspect was identified and indicted on theft, felony theft, and misue of credit card charges. ◆



COMMUNITY ORIENTED POLICING

C.O.P. Officer Audrey Wilt had a busy month with the Rock the Vote concert on May 2, two Girl Scout presentations, the Light Ohio Blue campaign, a Home Owners' Association meeting for Grandshire, six car seats, and the Memorial Day Parade.

DRONE

The Delaware County Sheriff's Office and the Ohio State Highway Patrol requested drone assistance with a suspect at large.

Officer Jared Wilt deployed the Mavic Enterprise and captured the suspect's apprehension on video. He also filmed the Memorial Day parade using the Mavic Enterprise.

CRISIS INTERVENTION TEAM



Police respond to many calls that are not criminal in nature. Using a CIT (Crisis Intervention Team) disposition notifies HelpLine of Delaware and Morrow Counties that there is a need for further assistance. HelpLine reviews the call information and assigns

follow up by agencies such as Maryhaven, SourcePoint, Syntero, or the Delaware County Board of Mental Health.

In May, there were three calls with CIT dispositions.

USE OF FORCE

The Powell Police Department carefully tracks all uses of force by the agency.

There were no uses of force in May.

TRAFFIC SURVEY (STEALTH STAT)

The Police Department uses this data to assign officers for selective enforcement efforts.

Average Speed: The average speed of all vehicles registered by the StealthStat device.

85th Percentile: 85 percent of all vehicles were at this speed or slower.

Ten-Mile Pace: The range of speeds in which the majority of vehicles were traveling. **Vehicles per Hour:** On busy streets, the device cannot accurately count vehicles in the far lane.

21-0356	5/5/2021	ACDA	Units 1 and 2 were southbound on N. Liberty St. at Seldom Seen Rd. Unit 2 was stopped at the traffic signal waiting to turn right from southbound N. Liberty Street to westbound Seldom Seen Road, when Unit 1 struck from behind. Unit 1 did not speak English and was unable to fill out a statement. CITED

CASE	DATE	CAUSE	NARRATIVE
21-0357	5/5/2021	HIT-SKIP	Injury Unit 2 was southbound on Liberty Street south of Powell Road. Unit 2 saw a vehicle pull out of Espresso 22 and was afraid she was going to be struck. Unit 2 dropped her motorcycle in the street causing damage and personal injury. Unit 1 continued on without stopping.
21-0365	5/8/2021	FAILURE TO YIELD	Unit 2 was eastbound on SR 750 coming through the intersection of Sycamore Ridge Dr. At this time Unit 1 attempted to turn out of Sycamore Ridge Dr. in time to get in front of Unit 2 but failed to do so in time. Resulting in Unit 1 striking Unit 2 on the front passenger side. Unit 1 was cited for failing to yield right of way. CITED
21-0367	5/8/2021	DEER	Unit 1 was traveling southbound on Murphy Parkway. A deer ran west in front of Unit 1 and was struck.
21-0370	5/9/2021	HIT-SKIP	Unit 1 drove off the right side of the roadway on Grandshire Drive, where it struck a pedestrian crossing sign. The driver of Unit 1 did not remain in the area, nor did they report the crash to law enforcement, as they left the scene of the crash. Unit 1 was later located by patrolling officers, parked in a driveway, and contact was made with the driver of Unit 1. CITED
21-0379	5/13/2021	ACDA	Unit 1 was traveling eastbound on West Olentangy St. near Lincoln St. Unit 2 and Unit 3 were stopped in traffic, eastbound on West Olentangy St. near Lincoln St. Unit 1 failed to keep an assured clear distance ahead and rear ended Unit 2. Unit 2 failed to control its vehicle after the collision and rear ended Unit 3. CITED
21-0380	5/13/2021	ACDA	Units 1 and 2 were westbound on SR 750 east of Murphy Parkway. Unit 2 stopped for traffic and Unit 1 was unable to stop and struck the rear of Unit 2. CITED
21-0381	5/13/2021	BACKING	Unit 1 was parked facing westbound on SR 750. Unit 1 attempted to pull into traffic on SR 750. Unit 1 did not see unit 2. Unit 1 struck Unit 2 which caused Unit 1 to be pushed into Unit 3 that was also parked on SR750. CITED
21-0382	5/14/2021	FAILURE TO CONTROL	Injury Unit 1 was traveling east on Home Rd. Unit 1 was distracted by a cell phone, turned the wheel abruptly, and continued traveling northeast into the turn lane on Home Rd. Unit 1 rolled over onto the west lane of travel on Home Rd. and struck a sign, then slid into a ditch. CITED

21-0388	5/18/2021	ACDA	Units 1 and 2 were traveling westbound on West Olentangy St. near Village Pointe Dr. Unit 2 stopped in traffic at a red light and was rear ended by Unit 1. CITED
21-0390	5/19/2021	FAILURE TO CONTROL	Unit 1 was pulling into a parking spot at 8771 Moreland St. and struck a parked Unit 2.
21-0399	5/22/2021	ACDA	Injury Unit 2 and Unit 3 were stopped in traffic, facing east on W Olentangy St. Unit 1 was traveling east on W Olentangy St. behind Unit 2. Unit 1 struck the rear of Unit 2. Unit 2 then struck the rear of Unit 3. CITED
21-0402	5/25/2021	BACKING	Unit 1 backed out of the driveway at 8636 Blue Water Drive and scraped Unit 1 along a mailbox causing damage to Unit 1.
21-0404	5/27/2021	HIT-SKIP	A unknown unit struck a light pole across from 70 Grace Drive.
21-0412	5/18/2021	FAILURE TO CONTROL	Unit 1's driver left his car in gear/drive accidentally and exited his car. Unit 1 then rolled into the garage at 218 Donerail, damaging the door.
