NOTABLE CASES

Daycare Center | A daycare worker in Powell was sentenced to 15 days in jail, five years probabtion and substantial fines for assault and endangering children. Officers and detectives began investigating the case in March of 2021.

Used Car Lot | The proprietor of a used car lot in Powell (now closed) was sentenced to community service, five years of probation and \$9,595 restitution for theft and prohibited acts involving certificates of title. This investigation included dozens of victims and dated back to July of 2020.

Stolen Vehicle | Four juveniles were stopped in a stolen vehicle on Club Way Court. The vehicle contained numerous items, including a firearm, reported as stolen from other vehicles. The juveniles were charged with receiving stolen property. One was also charged with obstruction for giving a false name. •



COMMUNITY ORIENTED POLICING

Ninety children attended Safety Camp in July which included a day with the police department. **C.O.P. Officer Audrey Wilt** coordinated a cruiser display and tours of the jail. Each child had a fingeprint taken and learned about the role of fingerprints in law enforcement.

Officer A. Wilt also attended bike school in preparation for joining the Powell Bike Patrol. •

CRISIS INTERVENTION TEAM

Police respond to many calls that are not criminal in nature. Using a CIT (Crisis Intervention Team) disposition notifies HelpLine of Delaware and Morrow Counties that there is a need for further assistance. HelpLine reviews the call information and assigns follow up by agencies such as Maryhaven, SourcePoint, Syntero, or the Delaware County Board of Mental Health.

In July, there were seven calls with CIT dispositions.

DRONE

None of the drones were deployed in July. ◆

USE OF FORCE

The Powell Police Department carefully tracks all uses of force by the agency. There was one use of force in July.

❖ Police were dispatched to a home in Woods of Big Bear Farm on a report of a domestic. The subject was agitated, intoxicated, and had a long history of mental health problems. Officers had to use force to restrain her for her safety and the safety of officers and medics. ◆

TRAFFIC SURVEY (STEALTH STAT)

The Police Department uses this data to assign officers for selective enforcement efforts.

Average Speed: The average speed of all vehicles registered by the StealthStat device.

85th Percentile: 85 percent of all vehicles were at this speed or slower.

Ten-Mile Pace: The range of speeds in which the majority of vehicles were traveling.

Vehicles per Hour: On busy streets, the device cannot accurately count vehicles in the far lane.




CASE	DATE	CAUSE	NARRATIVE
21-0486	7/1/2021	BACKING	Injury Units 1 and 2 were northbound on Murphy Pkwy. Unit 1 missed a turn and stopped. Unit 1 proceeded to back up and struck Unit 2. CITED
21-0493	7/4/2021	HIT-SKIP	Unit 1 was eastbound on SR 750. Unit 1 went off the roadway striking a street sign and continued eastbound without reporting the crash.
21-0501	7/6/2021	FAIL TO CONTROL	Unit 1 was driving through the lot at 47 Hall Street and got distracted looking to see if the splash pad was open. Unit 1 ran off the right side of the road and struck a mailbox.
21-0503	7/6/2021	FAIL TO CONTROL	Unit 1 was attempting to drive in parking stalls at 4000 W. Powell Rd. Unit 1 misjudged the negotiation and struck Unit 2 which was parked.

21-0510	7/8/2021	FAIL TO YIELD	Unit 2 was traveling westbound on SR 750 when Unit 1 turned out of Sawmill Rd. to head westbound and struck the side of Unit 2.
21-0512	7/10/2021	ACDA	Injury Units 2 and 3 were stopped in traffic in the eastbound lane of W. Powell Road just east of Valley Run Drive within the City of Powell. Unit 1 rear-ended Unit 2 with enough force to push Unit 2 into Unit 3.
21-0516	7/11/2021	FAIL TO CONTROL	Unit 1 was traveling north on Murphy Pkwy above the posted speed limit. Unit 1 attempted to negotiate the curve and lost control of their vehicle traveling off the roadway. Unit 1 hit two trees, went through a fence and came to rest in the wooded area on the north side of Murphy Pkwy. CITED
21-0525	7/15/2021	ACDA	Injury Units 1, 2, and 3 were eastbound on SR 750 east of Sycamore Ridge Dr. Units 2 and 3 stopped for traffic. Unit 1 struck Unit 2 pushing the unit into Unit 3. CITED
21-0539	7/21/2021	BACKING	Injury Unit 1 was backing out of a parking spot at 240 N. Liberty St. and struck Unit 2 as Unit 2 was traveling westbound in the parking lot.
21-0540	7/22/2021	HIT-SKIP	Unit 1 was westbound on SR 750 at Depot St. Unit 1 attempted to turn right onto Depot St. and the trailer struck a street sign.
21-0547	7/24/2021	ACDA	Units 1, 2, and 3 were westbound on SR 750 approaching the intersection of Murphy Pkwy. Units 2 and 3 slowed down for traffic. Unit 1 failed to stop and struck Unit 2 from behind, pushing Unit 2 into the rear of Unit 3. CITED
21-0551	7/27/2021	FAIL TO CONTROL	Injury Owner of Unit 1 exited the vehicle in the driveway and failed to place the vehicle in park. Unit 1 rolled backwards while unoccupied and struck its owner Unit 2. Unit 1 continued to roll into the roadway of Village Club Dr. and struck Unit 3 as it was parked unoccupied in front of 3455 Village Club Dr.
21-0553	7/27/2021	HIT-SKIP	Injury Unit 1 failed to yield while making a left turn onto Rutherford Rd from northbound Sawmill Pkwy. As a result, Unit 1 was struck by Unit 2 which was heading southbound on Sawmill Pkwy.

21-0556	7/31/2021	OVI	Injury Unit 1 was northbound on Sawmill Pkwy. Unit 1 failed to control the vehicle, struck a curb, drove off the right side of the roadway and struck a fire hydrant. Unit 1 continued northbound and reentered Sawmill Pkwy. before coming to final rest.
21-0557	7/31/2021	ACDA	Unit 2 was stopped in traffic facing west near 122 E Olentangy Street. Unit 1 was stopped behind Unit 2 on SR 750. Unit 1 began traveling west and struck the rear of Unit 2. CITED

MAP OF TRAFFIC CRASHES





July 2021 Crash Type


