#### **NOTABLE CASES**

**Huffing** | Officers responded to a business on Sawmill Parkway three times on reports of an unresponsive person. A man had been huffing compressed air. He received a warning the first time; he was taken to the hospital for medical evaluation the second time; and he was charged with abusing harmful intoxicants the third time.

**Shoplifting** | A suspect was charged with three instances of stealing liquor from a business on West Powell Road. The suspect was captured on video and identified by the store's loss prevention officer. •

#### CRISIS INTERVENTION TEAM

Police respond to many calls that are not criminal in nature. Using a CIT (Crisis Intervention Team) disposition notifies HelpLine of Delaware and Morrow Counties that there is a need for further assistance. HelpLine reviews the call information and assigns follow up by agencies such as Maryhaven, SourcePoint, Syntero, or the Delaware County Board of Mental Health.

In March, there were seven calls with CIT dispositions.

#### **TRAINING**

In March the department conducted 186.75 hours of total training to include Legal Updates, Domestic Violence Legal Updates, NIMS Training, Public Information Officer training, First Line Supervision, Temporary Holding Facility, and 48.75 hours of Continuing Professional Training covering various topics and training areas. •

#### **COMMUNITY ORIENTED POLICING**

COP Officer Audrey Wilt gave three presentations at Olentangy Liberty High School. She participated in the Coffee and Conversations program on Senior Scams. Other officers helped with golf cart inspections, car seat installations, and a Town Hall at StoryPoint.

#### **USE OF FORCE**

The Powell Police Department carefully tracks all uses of force by the agency. There were no uses of force in March. ◆

#### TRAFFIC SURVEY (STEALTH STAT)

The Police Department uses this data to assign officers for selective enforcement efforts.

**Average Speed:** The average speed of all vehicles registered by the StealthStat device. **85th Percentile:** 85 percent of all vehicles were at this speed or slower.

**Ten-Mile Pace:** The range of speeds in which the majority of vehicles were traveling. **Vehicles per Hour:** On busy streets, the device cannot accurately count vehicles in the far lane.



CASE	DATE	CAUSE	NARRATIVE
22-03992	3/1/2022	MARKED LANES	Injury   Unit 1 was northbound on SR 315 just south of Retreat Lane. Unit 2 was southbound in the same area. Unit 2 saw the driver of Unit 1 cross left of center. Unit 2 swerved left of center to try to avoid a collision. Unit 1 swerved back into the northbound lane and collided with Unit 2 head on. Both vehicles traveled off the roadway after separating and came to rest on the east side of SR 315. PENDING
22-04033	3/2/2022	FAILURE TO YIELD	While attempting a left turn from the southwest to the west, Unit 1 was struck by Unit 2 who was traveling westbound on Galloway Drive. Unit 2 swerved to avoid the collision and struck the curb on the north side of Galloway Drive.
22-04054	3/2/2022	FAILURE TO CONTROL	Unit 1 and Unit 2 were northbound on Liberty Street just south of the railroad crossing. Unit 2 stopped for emergency services vehicle heading southbound. Unit 1 attempted to move out of the way for said vehicles and struck the rear of Unit 2. CITE

22-04494	3/8/2022	FAILURE TO CONTROL	Unit 1 was backing out of 30 Thornbury Lane and struck the mailbox, knocking it down. Unit 1 did not make contact with homeowner and left the scene.
22-05082	3/16/2022	HIT-SKIP	Unit 2 was a parked motor vehicle in the lot of 47 Hall Street. Unit 2 was struck by Unit 1 which was backing.
22-05193	3/18/2022	FAILURE TO YIELD	Unit 1 was attempting a left turn from a gas pump on the southwest side of a business on Sawmill Parkway. Unit 1 turned left to the northeast while Unit 2 was backing to the southwest. Unit 2 struck Unit 1 in the front and was alerted by a bystander of the collision. This crash was captured on CCTV belonging to the store.
22-05198	3/18/2022	FAILURE TO CONTROL	Unit 1 was westbound on Presidential Parkway. Unit 1 turned left onto Sawmill Road, drove off the right side of the road becoming airborne. Unit 1 struck a culvert with the bottom of the vehicle and continued into the ditch. This crash occurred in Liberty Township and was taken under a mutual aid request.
22-05302	3/19/2022	FAILURE TO YIELD	Injury   Unit 1 was eastbound on North Hampton Drive. Unit 2 was northbound on Sawmill Parkway. Unit 1 failed to yield for left turn at flashing red light and struck Unit 2. CITE
22-05386	3/21/2022	FAILURE TO YIELD	Unit 1 was northbound on Sawmill Parkway attempting to turn west onto North Hampton Drive. Unit 2 was southbound on Sawmill Parkway. Unit 1 failed to yield on a westbound turn and was struck by Unit 2. CITE
22-06013	3/30/2022	ACDA	While slowed/stopped in traffic facing east, Unit 2 was struck from behind by Unit 1 who was also traveling east on West Olentangy Street. <b>CITE</b>
22-06057	3/31/22	BACKING	While backing from 311 Tree Haven Avenue South to the north, Unit 1 struck the left driver side door of Unit 2, which was facing west and parked on the north side of the street.
