Andrew White, City Manager, gave an overview of Ordinance 2023-15.

Mayor Swartwout opened the floor for public comment on Ordinance 2023-15.

James Sisto, 69 Morris Court, spoke in support of the project, but addressed City Council regarding concerns from his neighbors in the Morris Station neighborhood.

Hillary Laffin, Grand Communities, 3940 Olympic Blvd., Erlanger, KY 41018, representing the applicant, introduced herself and said she was available to answer any questions.

Mayor Swartwout closed public comment and declared Ordinance 2023-15 will go to a second reading at the next City Council Meeting on June 20, 2023.

Claudia Husak, Planning Director, reviewed the project and discussed the process from preliminary meetings Development Staff had with the applicant, to the Sketch Plan phase, Preliminary Development Plan, and then the Final Development Plan with the Planning & Zoning Commission, as well as presentations to the Historical Downtown Advisory Commission.

Mayor Swartwout invited Hillary Laffin, representing the applicant, Grand Communities, to give a presentation.

Ms. Laffin said Grand Communities is the affiliated development company for Fischer Homes. She talked about the context of the site, their vision for the project and the plan revisions they have made over the past year. Further, she answered questions from City Council.

Mayor Swartwout opened the floor for public comment on Ordinance 2023-14.

Garry Swackhamer, 76 Scioto Street, said he supports the project, but does have concerns about the construction traffic. He suggested removing the pork-chop at Olentangy and Depot Streets during the construction of the development.

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John Gibson, 119 Morris Court, complimented the builder on the landscaping and talked about the noise from train whistles as they approach Olentangy Street, especially at 3:45 a.m. He is requesting no construction traffic come through Morris Station.

Les Wibberley, 5005 Bayhill Drive, works with the OPAL Trails Committee and is recommending the trail included in the development be 10-feet wide for safety reasons.

James Sisto, 69 Morris Court, reiterated earlier comments that Morris Station residents have two primary concerns. One is the agreement regarding the retention pond and the other concern is the construction traffic. He thanked Grand Communities for working with his neighborhood and making the needed changes to the original plan.

Mayor Swartwout closed public comment and declared Ordinance 2023-14 will go to a second reading at the next City Council Meeting on June 20, 2023.

Mayor Swartwout discussed the Powell Festival 2023 coming up Friday, June 23rd and Saturday, June 24th, 2023. Mallory Sribanditmongkol, Strategic Communication Officer, gave an update on where residents can find information regarding the event with regards to the City of Powell website and other social media outlets.

Councilmember Drummond talked about her disappointment with regards to the cancellation of the Pride event and said she would like to see these types of cancellations better communicated to the constituents.

Councilmember Bennehoof talked about CPR training and said the general public can go to the Liberty Township Fire Department and sign up for public classes, which they hold monthly. He also made a suggestion regarding adding "Historic District" to the downtown street signs, which many other communities use.

Councilmember Ahmed asked if the City should create a circulation plan for construction traffic in regards to the larger asphalt trucks, concrete trucks, etc.

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Aaron Stanford, City Engineer, agreed and said the City will look at the opportunity to establish an enforceable construction route.

Councilmember Karr thanked Grant Crawford, Director of Public Service, and his team for all the great work they do, that many residents are unaware of. She appreciates their dedication.
